"Who I am" BY CHARLIE DELIA—Life story in his own words.

My Name is Charlie Delia,

As a child I had a hard life, Mum was sick I was looked after on and off by my Auntie, till Mum was O.K. Lost my Mother at age 6. Dad had 5 children, youngest son only 2 months old. Auntie looked after him for 6 months straight then was given back to Dad. The oldest was my sister 17; me & my 1 year older brother, dad took us to



orphanage, a place that looks after children with no parents. No fault to Dad as he had to work 50 hours a week, & had us 5

to look after, So

me & my brother I was 6, my brother was 7 years ended up in the orphanage. to me it was like a children's jail, all the presents we use to get from family & relatives, after they go, no longer ours, but for them to sell at a fete. I got so sick there with hepatitis, Dad saw that I should not stay there, so after I got O.K. he took us out. We lived the life of Oliver Twist, our schooling was sleep on the bench school. I still have memories and that 63 years ago.

Last time I saw my Mum, I was 6 Dad came for me at the

orphanage with the Holy Communion dress in white, and took me to see Mum in hospital, that was the last time I saw Mum alive, I went to live with my auntie again for few months, then gone home

after school could not find a job, Dad remarried again, I was on the roof, desperate, of suicide, lucky Dad's new wife came up, saw me crying, and comfort me told Dad to start give me some pocket money. After 5 months I found a job in wine factory, slave labour, 50 long hrs a week at age 16. Stayed 1 year, could not continue there, & emigrated to Australia age 17, because under age. My Sister decide to come with me. My sister had become our mother at her age of 17, till Dad had remarried 10 long years after.

I emigrated to Victoria Australia January 1967. Nearly 3 years after me and my Sister went back, try our luck again back home Malta, 1969 was the same as I left it, 50 hours a week, very low pay, I found a job as a hotel waiter, lasted 2 weeks only, could not take it anymore. Stayed in Malta 5 months, was great holiday for me, and came back to Australia. Now before I went to Malta I met my wife Freda at my cousin, she had lost her Mum too at age 9, when I saw her she was only 11, I was 18. I fell for her, but cause of her age I could not ask her to go out with her, but when I came back I met her again living with her sister and my cousin, she was older then she was 16, & I was 23. I asked her where she worked, said Cole's Sydney Road, Coburg. I went to see her at work next day & our relation started. Got married 16 months after. It was

written in our testament to be with each other, I found a good job at C.I.G. Preston in Medical Department with good wages. Retired after 32, in that time we had 2 children a son & a daughter, now we got 4 grandchildren, they had 2 each.

In 2005 I retired from work aged 56, year after I joined Whittlesea U3A, was recommended to us, by doing computer class in Mill Park & line dancing with John Whitelock.



Best thing me and my wife, Freda did. After that I joined the Whittlesea U3A choir. I love it so much, give the chance to sing as I love singing. I love the Monday morning tea, get together, and listen to any improvement Whittlesea U3A is doing, I am with Kathy computer class too, missed one term. I am in a Maltese Committee club as well. I love cooking as well. Best thing happened to me was joining Whittlesea U3A. I love day trips too.

That's who I am Charlie Delia.



Beryl Clarke spoke at the August morning tea about Art for Fun.

About 6 years ago, sisters, Rae and Robyn suggested an art class be included in Whittlesea U3A's program. The aim of the class was to provide a supporting venue where members could practice and experiment their art using whatever medium they wanted and paint whatever subject they chose, and most of all, to have FUN doing so. Originally, the class consisted of only a handful of members, but that has now grown. There is a waiting list and 2 more classes have been added.

The mediums used in class, include graphite pencils, coloured pencils, fluid filled pens similar to 'markers', pastels, acrylics, oils, watercolours and anything else that maybe on the market. In fact, most of the group use several mediums, sometimes all at the one time, which is called 'mixed media'

The experience level ranges from raw beginners who have never used a brush or drawn with a pencil, though to more experienced painters who produce excellent work. Most of the group have sold one or more paintings at the various shows they have attended.

Art for Fun has exhibited at shopping centres, libraries, and at the combined U3A exhibition at Parliament House, a couple of years ago. We also show at the City of Whittlesea annual art exhibition and at Kinglake Rotary Art Show. Currently, we have some of our work on display at the Two Bean and a Farm

Restaurant in the Carome Homestead, Mernda, where one was sold in the first week.

Robyn Phillips, is the group leader and has had quite a lot of painting experience. She gives helpful support wherever and whenever needed. Every couple of months she gives us a challenge in order to improve skills and widen members' knowledge of techniques.

I have been associated with the group for three and a half years and give monthly tutorials on whatever subjects members want to learn about. This also challenges their capabilities and helps them to grow. It has been a two-way learning process as some of the subjects that they have asked for, I know very little or nothing about...so I research and practice myself in order to teach them.

Art for Fun provides a means of socializing as well as enjoyment in learning new skills and when you watch their interaction and hear the chatter you know that the aim of the original leaders has been achieved in practicing

LOST & FOUND BY BROOKE DAVIS

I tend to review rather serious books, so this time I have selected a quirky amusing book based around three main characters.

There is Millie Bird, a seven-year-old girl obsessed with dying creatures; firstly her dog,

an old neighbour, bugs etc., and then her father. Soon after her father dies, her mother abandons her in a Department Store. Eventually she hides under a mannequin, where she stays at night. She keeps leaving notes around so her

in the shopping centre café during the day and sleeping in the Department Store at night. Then there is Agatha Pantha, an eighty-two year old lady who has not left the house since her husband died. She is a neighbour of Millie's.

Millie eventually leaves the store to evade the authorities who are trying to find her to place with carers in her mother's absence. She returns to her house, where Agatha befriends her. They decide to go and find Millie's mother and join up with Karl and the mannequin he has brought along with him.

They were all nice people, Agatha and Karl grieving for their loved, dead partners, lost opportunities and ageing bodies, and Millie realising her mother has actually abandoned her. It was sad, moving and hilarious at times and very thought provoking.

I wondered who the author's target audience was as it could appeal to teenagers and adults who like their characters a bit odd, but endearing. It came across as a whimsical story with implausible happenings along the way. I could actually visualise it as an illustrated children's book depicting Millie, Agatha and Karl's

Crotchet Baby Blanket—supplied by Freda Delia

MEASUREMENTS

Approximate Size - 80cms x 80cms

Requires 8 x 200g balls

(enough for 2 blankets, pictured blanket uses all Bold bamboo colours).

Bold Bamboo, Classic, Luxury, Stellar

Yarn quantities can vary and are therefore approximate requirements

Use only Bendigo yarns as specified.

ACCESSORIES

4.00mm crochet hook.

TENSION

Unlike knitting a garment a tension measurement is not essential when crocheting a blanket. Therefore, no tension measurement is needed.

ABBREVIATIONS (UK crochet terms used throughout this pattern)

Ch = chain, dc = double crochet, dec = decrease, rep = repeat;
sl st = slip stitch, sp = space, tr = treble.

BLANKET

(Working 3 rows of each colour)

- 1st Row (first block): Ch 6, tr in 4th chain from hook and in next 2 ch, turn.
- 2nd Row (2 blocks): Ch 6, tr in 4th ch from hook and in next 2 ch, (sl st, ch 3, 3 tr) into 3 ch sp of previous row, turn.
- 3rd Row (3 blocks): Ch 6, tr in 4th ch from hook and in next 2 ch, *(sl st, ch 3, 3 tr) into next 3 ch sp of previous row, rep from* to end, turn.

Rep 3rd row until side of work measures 80cm (or length desired).

1st Row (dec): Sl st across first 3 tr, *sl st, 3 ch, 3 tr into 3 ch sp of previous row, rep from * to last 3 ch sp (do not make a block in this last space), sl st in last space, turn.

Rep last row until 1 block remains, fasten off.

EDGING

- With right side facing work 2 rows of dc around edge of blanket.
- Work one row of crab stitch or backwards dc around entire- blanket.

Fasten off.

TO MAKE UP

Sew in ends. Press lightly with a warm iron and a damp cloth if desired.
